Interesting facts (Dholki)

1. Did you know about Dholki?

The Dholki is also known by the name Naal. As compared to the dholki, the dholki has longer and slimmer bodies. The dholki is used in **qawwali**, bhajan, **lavani**, **kirtan bhangra**, **chutney**, baithak gana, **tamasha**, street performance, and various classical styles. As compared to other similar instruments like the tabla and dholak, the dholki produces a loud sound.

2. In which region is dholki popular?

In <u>South Asia</u>, the dholki is a very popular musical instrument. Among South Asian countries, it is used in <u>India</u>, <u>Bangladesh</u>, and Pakistan.

3. What is dholki's material of construction?

A dholki is a barrel shaped instrument that has two different-sized heads. A small head is used to produce a high-pitched sound, while a large head is used to create a low-pitched sound. A small head is covered with goatskin. A large head is generally covered with buffalo skin. The body of the dholki is made of wood. **Sheeshame** and mango wood utilized for dholki.

4. Do you know about the size of a dholki?

The dholki looks like a barrel or cylinder shape. The length of a dholki is about 16–24 inches. Two drumheads show different sizes. The small head of the dholki is about 5.5-8 inches in diameter. The large head of the dholki is about 7.5 to 10 inches in diameter. Goat skin is used to produce a higher-pitched sound, while buffalo skin is used to produce a lower-pitched sound.
